Year 12 Biology students dissect fish heads

Our Year 12 A level Biology students participated in a fish head dissection as part of their A level biology course today.

This involved dissecting the gills and studying them under the microscope, as well as looking at the fish fins which look remarkably similar to insect wings when studied under a microscope.

The students have been learning all about the counter-current gas exchange system in fish and this activity enabled them to study the anatomy of the fish gills in more detail.

Students attend the Science and Engineering Showcase

Students attended the Science and Engineering Showcase at Plymouth University this term.

This event aims to raise students' aspirations in science and technology subjects and demonstrate how exciting STEM can be at A level and in higher education.

Students had the unique opportunity to talk with current undergraduate students, <u>PhD students and ac</u>ademics about what it's like to study and work in STEM.

After a tour of the campus, and a chemistry show, students spent the afternoon exploring the interactive exhibits in the marquee, ranging from the Iceberg Alley and Electron Microscopy to Google Earth virtual reality and Engineering research. Many of our students had the opportunity to hold some amazing invertebrates, use an electron microscope and have a go in the world record-breaking hand cycle, designed and built by staff and students in the School of Engineering, Computing and Mathematics at the University of Plymouth.

This whole event was a fantastic day for our students to be involved in, and has really shown them the range of opportunities that are available to them after finishing their GCSE's.

This was followed by another brilliant talk on Optometry from Alshana Rahmetulla from the University of Plymouth, who talked about how Optometrists are the front line of eye care and deal with all problems relating to the eyes.

SAFEGUARDING UPDATE

As technology moves at an alarming rate, trying to keep up with all the news apps and change can be a mind field for any parent/carer. In this section of the newsletter we will aim to keep you up to date with specific apps to be aware of, age restrictions and any concerning trends that relate to safeguarding children. It will also sign post any support that is offered by outside agencies.

APP SPOTLIGHT

SNAPCHAT

The app doesn't need any introduction at all. After all, it has millions of users from around the globe. However, the popular "bubble messaging" app does have its fair share of privacy and security issues that put many users' privacy at risk.

For instance, the app was hacked in 2014 and a large number of personal photos or Snapchat of users were publicised. Apart from that, the app does destruct the snaps, but there is a short window that people may use to take screenshots of the snap and later exploit it.

Age restriction: 13 years

OMEGLE

Omegle is a video chatting application that allows two parties to indulge in a video chat while being anonymous. The user is addressed as "You" while the other person is addressed as "Stranger."

The app has garnered the attention of many critics who deem the application as a perfect spot for predators who are after unsuspecting kids.

VIRTUAL REALITY & VIRTUAL WORLDS – NSPCC SAFETY GUIDANCE FOR PARENTS

They encourage parents to familiarise themselves with the risks young users can face in virtual worlds. They published new straightforward advice for families on how to keep children safe when using virtual reality including utilising the device's safety features and supervising children's use as they navigate both the virtual risks and physical space around them.

A NATION OF SAFEGUARDERS

The NSPCC has launched a new pilot programme called Listen Up Speak Up, which hopes to create a nation of 'safeguarders' among people who do not have primary safeguarding roles but might encounter children and families regularly. We're appealing to local organisations, businesses, members of the public, community groups, neighbourhood watch groups and sports clubs to take part by completing a free 10 minute digital training course, which will help them to identify signs of child neglect or abuse in the community and empower them to know how to raise concerns with someone who can help.

SAFEGUARDING LGBTQ+ YOUNG PEOPLE IN SPORT

LGBTQ+ children and young people face the same risks as all children and young people, but they are at greater risk of some types of abuse. It's essential that sport or activity providers create a supportive and welcoming culture for all children, safe from harm and a place where they can thrive. Being LGBTQ+ isn't a safeguarding risk, it's how others in our society may behave towards a young person who categorises themselves as LGBTQ+ that may cause risk.

FIT AND FED PROGRAMME

Plymouth City Council's Sports Development Unit coordinates a programme called Fit and Fed which is funded by the Department for Education (also known as Holiday Activity Fund HAF).

Fit and Fed provides free funded holiday club provision and focuses on children on benefit related free school meals. We are also able to offer a number of free funded places to Looked After Children, Children with Education, Health Care Plans, Foster Children, Children on Child Protection plans, Young Carers, children of recognised refugees and children from asylum seeking families.
