Restart A Heart Week

Approximately 30,000 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests happen every year in the UK. Sadly, less than 1 in 10 people survive these cardiac arrests. Performing CPR can more than double the chances of survival in some cases.

At Scott College, medical and healthcare education is at the heart of everything we do. To celebrate Restart A Heart Day, Mrs Sheaff has been working incredibly hard over the last three weeks, to train every single student and every member of staff in basic CPR and defibrillator training.

Mrs Sheaff said, "I believe teaching CPR to all our students and staff is of the greatest importance, I feel very sad about the statistic of a 1 in 10 chance of survival if you have a cardiac arrest outside a hospital setting. I want our students to feel confident enough to have a go at CPR if ever they were faced with that situation.

"Learning CPR in a classroom with your friends, being able to ask questions and having the assurance, courage and determination to undertake CPR will in the future, hopefully, alter those shocking statistics."

Mrs Merricks, Head of School at Scott College said, "I feel very proud of how the students have engaged with the restart a heart programme, and I am confident they all have a better understanding of how to support someone in difficulty. They listened intently during the instruction, but I was most impressed as I watched their deliberate practice of the skills, this really emphasised to me just how caring our students are, and as such how suited they are to their chosen pathway in the medical and healthcare sector."















Ski Trip 2023

Over the Easter break, 43 students and 4 staff members went on a trip of a lifetime, to beautiful Andorra for a week's skiing trip.

Pupils stayed in a 4-star hotel which looked directly out onto the slopes. Each day they had 5 hours of instructed skiing with the fantastic team at the slopes. Students challenged themselves daily and were able to practice on different difficulty slopes, skiing down green, blue, red and even black runs!

We cannot praise the pupils highly enough for pushing themselves out of their comfort zones and giving every lesson 110%. The students also behaved impeccably both on and off the ski slopes and enjoyed themselves tremendously.

This was the first successful Scott College ski trip, with many more to come!

The sun really did 'come out' as our wonderful cast of ANNIE wowed their audience.





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Bodmin Jail Trip


The History department took a group of Year 10 GCSE History students for a guided tour of Bodmin Jail.


The students were led around the jail learning fascinating facts about the Bloody Code and the change in prisons over the 1800's-1900s including the use of punishments and the role of public executions.

Biomedical Science Talk

Year 12 students from across campus were lucky enough to have a Medical Masterclass all about Biomedical Sciences, delivered by the fantastic Dr Paul Laurance-Young from University of Plymouth.

Daisy said, "Dr Laurance-Young was very engaging, and the topic was very interesting. His presentation style kept us interested all the way through. The material was related to real life and was really fascinating."

Gracie added, "It was a fantastic presentation and experience."

The students were both fascinated and mesmerised by the visit and have definitely taken away lots of information to help them with making their career choices.









E-coli workshop

Year 13 BTEC students carried out a practical procedure to investigate the effect of hand soap, disinfectant, and hand sanitizer on the growth of E.coli bacteria.

They used aseptic techniques to inoculate an agar plate with the bacteria, then placed paper discs soaked in each substance in the plate. The plates were then incubated for 48 hours to see which substance killed the most bacteria.

Braingineering Session

Students in Year 10, 11 and 12 enjoyed a 'Braingineering' session led by Dr John Chilton, from the University of Plymouth Medical School.

Students learned about the complexities of the brain and investigated its interpretation of the world - which they found fascinating!

Siobhan Moyes, Daniel Zahra and Lily Evans, staff at University of Plymouth Medical School, accompanied Dr Chilton and took the opportunity to talk about what University life is like - a really valuable experience for year 12 who are currently making their applications for further and higher education.

Dr Chilton said, "We thoroughly enjoyed the two days of Braingineering. It was fascinating talking about the complexities of the brain with the students, they asked lots of great questions. We loved seeing their varied reactions of shock and surprise as they realised how their brain plays tricks on them!"











Medical Law Trip

Campus Sixth Form students had the amazing opportunity to spend time at Plymouth University, where they took part in a lecture about the legal issues arising within the medical field.

What made the visit even more significant is that the talk was given by one of our former student's Lodine van Graan. Lodine is a second year undergraduate studying Law at Plymouth University. She now wishes to specialise in medical law and this presentation highlighted her drive and hard work.

The presentation also touched on how to improve Mental Health and Wellbeing at university, a very useful focus. This visit further cemented the great links that our careers department have forged with the University.

Our students took part in role play tasks, and linked broken sentences to gain more knowledge. They also heard real stories to aid their understanding.

Polly, Year 13 student said "It was so interesting to hear the stories and know what individuals go through with Dementia. It really made me think."

Sophia said "I really enjoyed the session; it was so informative, and I now know what I can do to support and help individuals with Dementia."



Matters workshop with The Co-operative Bank

This week, our Year 12 students took part in a Money Matters workshop with The Co-operative Bank.

The session involved informative discussions about scam awareness and ethics around banking. They also played a budgeting game that gave the students an opportunity to look at household expenses and unexpected costs which may make them think differently about budgeting and spending.





Biology students dissect sheep heart

Our Year 12 A level Biologists who had completed their theory around the structure of the heart, worked in pairs to dissect lamb hearts. This is part of the practical requirement of their A level Biology course.

They enjoyed identifying the different sides of the heart, the chambers, the atrioventricular valves, various blood vessels such as the aorta and vena cava as well as the coronary arteries.

Students attend the Science and Engineering Showcase

Students attended the Science and Engineering Showcase at Plymouth University this term.

This event aims to raise students' aspirations in science and technology subjects and demonstrate how exciting STEM can be at A level and in higher education.

Students had the unique opportunity to talk with current undergraduate students, PhD students and academics about what it's like to study and work in STEM.

After a tour of the campus, and a chemistry show, students spent the afternoon exploring the interactive exhibits in the marquee, ranging from the Iceberg Alley and Electron Microscopy to Google Earth virtual reality and Engineering research. Many of our students had the opportunity to hold some amazing invertebrates, use an electron microscope and have a go in the world record-breaking hand cycle, designed and built by staff and students in the School of Engineering, Computing and Mathematics at the University of Plymouth.

This whole event was a fantastic day for our students to be involved in, and has really shown them the range of opportunities that are available to them after finishing their GCSE's.















Getting creative with intestines

Our talented A-level student Rachel, recently completed an impressive representation of the intestine system made out of crochet for her Extended Project Qualification.

"I am hoping to go into medicine, so I decided to do an artefact with a medical focus. I also recently learnt to crochet, so I combined this with my interest in anatomy to crochet a life-size digestive system. I learnt to plan and manage my own time, conduct scientific research and adapt my project to overcome challenges.

"In my research, I explored the use of models in medical education and training, as well as the use of visual aids for paediatric patients. This meant I could suggest a real life application for the project - to be used for paediatric patients with digestive conditions."





Students look at Hooke's Law

Year 9 students have been investigating Hooke's Law this half term as part of their core practical for their GCSE course.

They looked at the behaviour of a spring as they loaded it with different forces/weights and took extension readings.

The students then plotted a graph to show the relationship between the two.

National Allied Health Professions Day

Students had an online talk from Speakers for Schools, hearing from different members of NHS staff promoting the Allied Health roles, which coincided with National Allied Health Professions Day this month.

The event hosted over 100 universities, colleges, and apprenticeship employers. It gave them a fantastic opportunity to learn about different options and pathways for their future.




Physiotherapy Talk

Some students even expressed their aspirations to one day become university students themselves, highlighting the inspiration and motivation kindled by this experience.




The Duke of Edinburgh Activity
