

RE: Personal Social Health Education Year 11

Parents and Carers,

As a part of your child's education at Scott Medical and Healthcare College, we promote personal wellbeing and development through a comprehensive Personal, Social, Health and Economic (PSHE) education programme. The Relationships and Sex Education (RSE) curriculum is taught throughout the school in every year group through PSHE lessons and curriculum collapse sessions. The curriculum is monitored and reviewed regularly by the staff and governing body.

Relationships, Sex and Health education (RSHE) is the curriculum subject that gives young people the knowledge, understanding, attitudes and practical skills to live safe, healthy, productive lives and meet their full potential.

I am writing to you to outline what we are covering through the year. In Year 11, the main focus is Sexual Health. Year 11s study the importance of their sexual health and the impact bad choices can have. They revisit contraception and STIs in further detail. They look at respect in relationships and the importance of this. They then look at fertility and what can impact fertility, leading on to different types of fertility treatment.

Lessons will include:

- Consent
- Drugs and Alcohol
- Abuse and exploitation
- Sexual relationships including STI's, contraception and fertility

Pupils also have opportunities to ask questions that help prepare them for relationships of all kinds in the modern world.

APP SPOTLIGHT

TELEGRAM: A SECURE MESSAGING APP

Telegram is a messaging app that offers end-to-end encryption, making it a secure platform for sending messages, making voice and video calls, and sharing media. Here's what you need to know:

- **Privacy Settings:** Telegram allows users to customize their privacy settings. Encourage your child to set their profile to "private" to control who can contact them and view their profile picture.
- **Content Sharing:** While Telegram is relatively secure, remind your child to avoid sharing personal or sensitive information with strangers. Encourage them to be cautious when sharing location data.
- **Parental Controls:** Telegram does not have built-in parental control features. However, you can monitor your child's usage and communicate openly about responsible online behaviour.

Health and Wellbeing

In PSHE this half term, the focus is all around health and wellbeing. Students will be exploring elements around physical health and also mental health.

A large number of children and young people will experience behavioural or emotional problems at some stage. For some, these will resolve with time, while others will need professional support. It might be difficult to know if there is something upsetting your child but there are ways to spot when something is wrong. The NHS advises to look out for:

- Significant changes in behaviour
- Ongoing difficulty sleeping
- Withdrawing from social situations
- not wanting to do things they usually like
